Turning the unpublic into public. Public art in the post-soviet context

Last year at this time, Joanna Warsza was starting her job as head of the Public Program of Manifesta 10 in St. Petersburg. The first visit of the artists coincided with the annexation of Crimea, which confronted Manifesta with a classic political dilemma of engagement or disengagement. The talk will propose a reflection on curatorial and artistic scenarios and political dilemmas while working in the public realm in places marked by a post-communist condition such as Russia, Georgia or Poland. What are the core ethical and aesthetical questions, and can art become an agent of the exciting possibility of political rapprochement, or is that too much to expect?
